In music this year we have many activities planned for the children to enjoy! This term, Year 5 have been very creative writing their own raps. Year three took part in a workshop last week focusing on Indian drumming and the children had a great time learning and playing the different drums! Year 4 are just starting their new unit where they will be creating electronic music using googleband lab. Year 6 have been learning about music in the 1920s through to the 1940s to support their history lessons on Word War 2.

Singing stars has got off to great start with many of the children in school attending and enjoying rehearsals. In December the children are going to perform seasonal songs at Luton Airport to travellers. At William Austin Juniors, we are also proud to offer the children the opportunity of learning the guitar. Guitar lessons are on a Thursday during school time and taught by a professional musician. Dear Parents.

I was fortunate enough to attend an English Network meeting last week and there was a big focus on reading and the benefits of reading with our children.

Here are some key facts in relation to the number of minutes a child reads per day and the number of words they are exposed to. As well as reading in school, we also encourage our children to read at home with their parents- please support your child by listening to them read each day and signing the reading record. I have also attached some information on supporting your child with reading at home. Please do speak with your child's teacher if you have any questions.

7 Top Tips to Support Key Stage 2 Children Reading at Home

Shared reading is a great way to develop children's language and communication and to boost their reading skills. Regular reading routines can offer lots of opportunities for learning during school closures—these tips are aimed at supporting children in Key Stage 2.

1 Concentrate on reading quality (it isn't all about reading lots!)



Don't worry too much about the 'what' and 'how' of reading each day. Books are great—but leaflets, comics, recipes and instructions on a webpage can all be great too. Why not set your child a reading challenge: How many different things can you read in a day?

2 Ask your child lots of questions



All reading matters. Shared reading is about 'reading with', not just 'reading to'. Why not take turns to read a page each of a longer novel? So, ask lots of 'Wh' questions, such as Who? What? When? Wher? Why? Try them when talking about books: for example, 'what do you think Harry is feeling?'

3 Ask your child to make predictions about what they have read



If it is a book, look at the front cover—or the last chapter—and talk about what might happen next. Look for clues in the book and be a reading detective! For example, 'can you see the fox on the front cover? Why do you think he's so sad?'

Ask your child to summarise what they have read



When you've finished reading, talk about what happened. Think about how the characters behaved and interesting things that happened in the plot. You could encourage your child to keep a **reading diary**, describing the big idea of each chapter.

5 Ask your child to write about what they have read



Write, or draw pictures, from anything you've read! Big writing and pictures are even more fun. For example, use an old roll of wallpaper (or chalk on a path) and draw around your child. Ask them to fill the outline with lots of information about the main character.

6 Read and discuss reading with friends or family



Make books a part of the family. Encourage your child to share them with a relative or friend, over a video call. Laugh about them when you are making meals together. For example, 'you could use your slimepower to help me cook tea tonight.'

7 Maintain the motivation to read



Talk about the joy of reading whenever you can. Give your child choices about what they read, being in control is great motivation! Encourage them to recommend books to family and friends. For example, 'you should read this book, Grandad, because you love funny stories.'


